About us

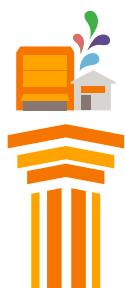

2024 Grants

The Highland County Community Fund, in partnership with the Foundation for Appalachian Ohio, awarded four grants, totaling \$11,500, in 2024.

Hillsboro Christian Academy

With no library on its campus, Hillsboro Christian Academy busses its third-grade students to the local library twice a month. It's a move designed to help students meet the rising expectations of Ohio's Third Grade Reading Guarantee but one that also sacrifices students' time in the classroom.

This grant is funding the purchase of approximately 300 books to outfit a library with reading material covering various interests for students reading below, at or above grade level.

Hillsboro First Baptist Church

To date, the Diaper Depot, a ministry of Hillsboro First Baptist Church, has distributed more than 25,000 diapers to a growing number of Highland County families who need help securing this necessary and increasingly costly item.

This grant is continuing three years of financial support HCCF has provided to this effort, helping to fill a basic but big need for Highland County families and our youngest community members.

Area 937 Community Outreach Inc.

Since 2009, Area 937 Community Outreach has provided support to Highland County residents who are unemployed, underserved or struggling to provide food, clothing and daily necessities for their families. It serves an average of 63 households per month through its free choice food pantry and clothing closet, as well as provides families with much needed protein options.

This grant is funding the purchase of higher quality meats for the nonprofit's monthly food distributions, providing local at-risk families healthier options.

Grow! Highland County

For the past 15 years, a group of successful Highland County businesspeople have been on a mission to grow our county – one business at a time. By sharing their expertise and resource connections, they are helping local community members with business ideas turn their dreams into reality, adding more than 110 jobs, retaining another 55+ jobs and contributing an estimated \$725,000 to Highland County's economy since 2017 alone.

This grant is supporting Grow! Highland County's enterprise facilitation programming that provides free and confidential resources for new and existing businesses in Highland County.



Investing in Highland County's young leaders

In 2023, we teamed up with FAO to award grants supporting projects developed and implemented by local youth under age 18. One of those youth-led grants supported the 2024 Summer Discover Inspire Grow Groups, a program of the Greenfield Area Christian Center's New Directions Youth Ministry. More than 80 students in grades 4-12 participated in the program and several of its community service projects, including working in the garden at Adena Greenfield Medical Center and baking and delivering muffins to local first responders and families experiencing hardship and loss.

Answering the call to lead and serve in Highland County

In 2023, FAO and its affiliate foundation partners welcomed the inaugural class of Growing Home Fellows, including two individuals living and/or working in Highland County. In exchange for committing to live, work and volunteer in their communities for five years, these young community builders receive a financial stipend and access to a leadership program and coaching. In 2024, the fellows began implementing service projects in our communities.

Ali Vesey



Ali Vesey is a teacher at Greenfield Elementary School who serves in a variety of roles outside the classroom, including president of Y-Gradale, a women's service group, and a board member of Main Street Downtown Greenfield and Grow Greater Greenfield. Her Growing Home Fellowship service is the Give & Gather Project, showcasing local philanthropic endeavors while fostering connections between volunteers and organizations. In 2024, Ali hosted the first Service Showcase, which gave organizations an opportunity to share their goals and provided residents a chance to learn about local service opportunities. In September 2024, she was named Greenfield Village Citizen of the Month for her work with Main Street Downtown Greenfield.

Ellie Wright

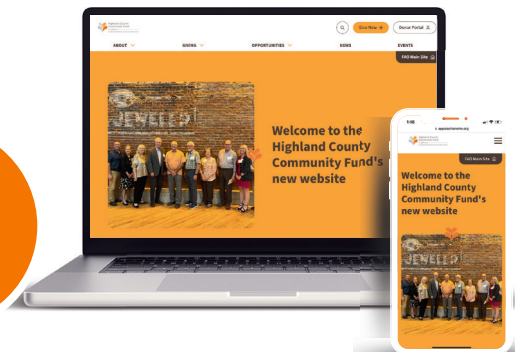
