### **2023 GRANTS**

In partnership with the Foundation for Appalachian Ohio, the Meigs County Foundation awarded 17 grants, totaling \$50,150, in 2023.

#### **BETHEL WORSHIP CENTER**

Bethel Worship Center launched "It's Our Time: Meigs Mobile Food and Supplies Outreach" to assist low-income Meigs County residents who have limited access to local food pantries or hot meals. MCF grants have supported that mission for the past two years, bringing sustenance and community love to our neighbors in need.

## CHESTER YOUTH BASEBALL AND SOFTBALL AND TUPPERS PLAINS YOUTH BASEBALL (2 GRANTS)

If you build it, they will come. When youth organizations in Chester and Tuppers Plains built batting cages for their youth leagues and communities, so many people came that the new amenities quickly became mud holes from use. These grants are funding concrete, which will be covered by turf, making the batting cages accessible for years to come.

#### **COLUMBIA TOWNSHIP TRUSTEES**

It is estimated that at least 30 percent of the community accesses food and other necessities from the Blessing Box in Columbia Township. This grant is funding the purchase of storage cabinets and food for the Blessing Box, ensuring this lifeline is stocked and available to all who need it.

#### **EASTERN LOCAL SCHOOL DISTRICT (2 GRANTS)**

Through support from the Buckley Family, MCF awarded two grants to benefit students in the Eastern Local School District. One grant is funding the purchase of tools and materials to help the Eastern FFA create a greenhouse and community garden for staff, students and the community. The other is funding tools and supplies the Science Olympiad team needs to advance in competition and to expand the academic competition to both high school and junior high students.



God's Hands At Work, which has received grants from the Meigs County Foundation the past two years, provides food and other life necessities to the underserved with the help of volunteers who donate their time to help package food boxes.

#### **GOD'S HANDS AT WORK**

God's Hands At Work started its Meigs County mobile food pantry three years ago to help address food insecurity in the most rural areas of the county. Every quarter, they hold a distribution at various locations, providing 300-400 individuals at each event a box containing enough food for approximately two weeks. This grant is funding the purchase of food for those distributions.

#### HABITAT FOR HUMANITY OF SOUTHEAST OHIO

In 2024, Habitat for Humanity of Southeast
Ohio is embarking on its third home build in
Meigs County – a community endeavor that
is providing an affordable
home to a local family and
giving hundreds of volunteers
the opportunity to gain
skills while serving others.
This grant is supporting that
home build, an investment in
the community and a local

family's dream.



In 2023, the Meigs County Schools Food Pantry served a total of 7,173 people, including 3,897 children and 3,276 adults – all thanks to donors and volunteers who have supported this community effort for the past three years.

#### **LUTHERAN SOCIAL SERVICES OF CENTRAL OHIO**

Every month, Lutheran Social Services holds a food pantry distribution at the Rutland Civic Center, providing healthy food to residents in need. This grant is funding food purchases for the distributions, assisting the increasing number of our neighbors who need a helping hand.

#### MEIGS COUNTY COUNCIL ON AGING

The Blakeslee Center in Middleport continues to grow and is fielding more requests from people interested in hosting conferences, trainings and other events. This grant is funding upgrades to the Blakeslee's conference and training equipment and ensuring the venue can meet the needs of groups from the community, region and state.

#### **MEIGS COUNTY FARMERS' MARKET**

Many local veterans report they are not able to shop locally for fresh food. The Meigs County Farmers' Market's veteran voucher program provides the men and women who have served our country with \$10 vouchers weekly to purchase produce. This grant will help fund that program for an estimated 600 veterans in 2024 and help cover the cost of the market's free educational classes.

#### MEIGS COUNTY SCHOOLS FOOD PANTRY

In Meigs County, 16.7 percent of the population is food insecure, according to Feeding America. In 2021, MCF, in partnership with the Meigs Local, Eastern Local and Southern Local school districts, established the Meigs County Schools Food Pantry. This grant is funding the purchase of food for the pantry, which provides a monthly, year-round distribution of healthy, nutritious food to school-age children and their families experiencing food insecurity.



A 2022 MCF grant helped fund additional equipment for the River of Life Food Pantry. A 2023 grant is continuing support for the nonprofit, which has been helping to feed Meigs County residents for 30-plus years.

#### MID-VALLEY CHRISTIAN SCHOOL

During the 2022-23 school year, several middle and high school students at Mid-Valley Christian School in Middleport started a band – and raised awareness that a music program was needed. The school invested in an online music curriculum in 2023. This grant is helping to purchase the instruments and supplies needed to complete the school's new music program.

#### **RIVER OF LIFE FOOD PANTRY**

The River of Life Food Pantry, which served an estimated 15,000 people in 2023, has been helping to feed Meigs County residents for more than 30 years. This grant is supporting their long-time and much-needed service to our communities with the purchase of food.

#### SOUTHERN LOCAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

The 2023-24 school year is a little brighter at the Southern Local School District, which went more than 15 years without an art program. This grant is funding the purchase of materials and equipment for the district's new Introduction to Art Program, bringing opportunities for creative expression and learning to students in third through 12th grade.

#### **OUR GROWING HOME FELLOWSHIP**

In 2023, FAO and its affiliate foundations welcomed the inaugural class of **Growing Home Fellows, including** seven individuals living and/or working in Meigs County: Ryan Davis, Ally Durst, Dylan Haynes, Kathryn Matson, Jenna Stoltzfus, Hannah Thompson and Maddie Wright. The Growing Home Fellowship is designed to recruit, retain and nurture our region's next generation of community builders. In exchange for committing to live, work and volunteer in their communities for five years, the fellows receive a financial stipend and access to a leadership program.

#### **VILLAGE OF RUTLAND**

The doors of the Rutland Civic Center's gymnasium must be replaced with ones that are fire-rated for the center to serve as an emergency shelter and host community events. This grant is funding the replacement of some of the gymnasium's doors – phase one of improvements being made to the center.

## **INVESTING IN OUR YOUNG LEADERS**

In 2023, FAO partnered with its affiliate foundations to fund projects developed and implemented by local youth under age 18. The goal of this funding is to empower young leaders and inspire them to embrace greater roles in their communities.

MCF awarded youth-led project grant funding to the **iBELIEVE Foundation**. The grant is funding the participation of five Meigs County high school students in the 2024 iBELIEVE Youth Leadership Workshops at no cost to them or their families. The workshops focus on leadership skill development with the goal of equipping young people to create positive change in their schools, communities and beyond.


