## **OUR GROWING HOME FELLOWS!**

In 2023, FAO and its affiliate foundations welcomed the inaugural class of Growing Home Fellows, including Kaylee Koker, a physical education teacher at Vinton County Local Schools, and Vinton County resident Hannah Thompson, an agriculture teacher at Meigs Local Schools.

The Growing Home Fellowship is designed to recruit, retain and nurture our region's next generation of community builders. In exchange for committing to live, work and volunteer in their communities for five years, the fellows receive a financial stipend and access to a leadership program.



## **2023 GRANTS**

In partnership with the Foundation for Appalachian Ohio, the Vinton County Community Fund awarded seven grants, totaling \$15,000, in 2023.

#### **EASTERSEALS CENTRAL AND SOUTHEAST OHIO**

In the coming year, 80 percent of Vinton County children eligible for the Dolly Parton Imagination Library of Ohio will be enrolled in the program – up from 42 percent in August 2022 – thanks to VCCF grants in 2022 and 2023. The program mails children ages 5 and younger a book each month, fostering a love of reading and putting our youth on a pathway to success.

#### THE IBELIEVE FOUNDATION

This grant is funding the participation of five Vinton County High School students in the 2024 iBELIEVE Youth Leadership Workshops at no cost to them or their families. The workshops focus on leadership skill development with the goal of equipping young people to create positive change in their schools, communities and beyond.

## OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY EXTENSION – VINTON COUNTY

Individuals ages 18-35 make up 19 percent of Vinton County's population; their community engagement and leadership are key to our future. This grant is supporting the participation of Vinton County residents in this age group in the 2024 Emerging Leaders Workshops, inspiring our young professionals to become positive and engaged leaders in their personal and professional lives.

#### **SOJOURNERS CARE NETWORK**

Youth experiencing homelessness face significant hurdles throughout the year, but the holiday season can be especially difficult. This grant is providing Vinton County youth experiencing homelessness a warm holiday experience, offering them a respite from their daily hardships in a nurturing environment where they can feel a sense of a community, support and the simple joys of the season.

#### **COMMUNITY HIGHLIGHT**



VCCF was established in August 2022 and that fall awarded its firstever grants. One of those grants was awarded to the Vinton County Soil and Water Conservation District.

The district used the funding to purchase equipment for and expand – by 33 percent – its local National Archery in the Schools Program, which not only instructs youth in the safe and effective use of archery equipment but opens the doors to all the joys of nature.

## 2023 GRANTS

#### VILLAGE OF MCARTHUR, MCARTHUR PARK BOARD AND WYMAN PARK

An active and engaged community is a healthy community. Building on the impact of a 2022 grant that extended a sidewalk to make the restrooms at Wyman Park more accessible for all, a 2023 grant is funding additional recreational equipment at McArthur's only park and the most utilized park in Vinton County.

#### VINTON COUNTY CANCER RESEARCH

In 2023, the nonprofit Vinton County Cancer Research provided gas cards to an average of 16 Vinton County residents per month, helping to fuel their travels for medical care due to a cancer diagnosis. This grant is funding the purchase of gas cards to help our neighbors – and their families – literally navigate their road to recovery.





Over the past several years, Wyman Park has seen many upgrades, spearheaded by the Vinton County Healthy Communities Coalition, Vinton County Board of Developmental Disabilities and McArthur Park Board. VCCF and its donors are honored to play a role in increasing and making more accessible opportunities to enjoy the outdoors, engage in recreational activities and gather in our community.

## **INVESTING IN VINTON COUNTY'S YOUNG LEADERS**

In 2023, FAO partnered with its affiliate foundations to support projects developed and implemented by local youth under age 18. The goal of this funding is to empower young leaders and inspire them to embrace greater roles in their communities.

#### **VINTON COUNTY SCHOOLS BETA CLUB**

VCCF awarded youth-led project grant funding to the Vinton County Schools Beta Club. Composed of approximately 80 students in sixth through 12th grade, Vinton County Schools Beta Club is the local chapter of the National Beta Club, whose mission is to prepare youth to be tomorrow's leaders. Its motto? "Let us lead by serving others."

The grant will be used to finance the club's community services projects throughout the school year and participation in leadership events such as the State Convention and Leadership Summit.

## Fair to Family alliance nearly triples program's impact

Vinton County Middle School teacher Megan Macke launched Fair to Family in 2019, inviting buyers at the Vinton County Junior Fair's livestock sale to donate hogs they purchase to help feed those who would go hungry without assistance from the St. Francis Evangelization Center's food pantry.

Macke thought Fair to Family, which had been yielding three to four donated hogs annually, would end after the 2022 event. VCCF asked Macke if she would help continue the program with VCCF taking the lead – and a partnership was born. The result? Eight of the 30 hogs purchased at the 2023 livestock sale were donated. A local family gave an extra hog. More than \$2,000 was raised to cover meat processing costs, and 1,586 packages of meat were delivered to the food pantry.

Last year's success is only the beginning. VCCF has assumed ownership of the program – and with the community's generosity looks to feed more neighbors in need.


