
CHANGING CHILDREN'S LIVES WITH A BOOK

Before the Harrison County Community Foundation, some local students had never owned a book. Now, because of the very first grants from the Harrison County Community Foundation and the Harrison Hills City School District Fund, all Harrison County students in grades K – 3 took home a book of their own, just in time for summer break.

"Through these grants, our school district alone sent almost 500 books out," said Dana Snider, superintendent of Harrison Hills City School District. "Our district is very thankful for this opportunity. This is a start that could change children's lives." These inaugural grants have not only marked an important first for the schools, but they are the first example of what community philanthropy can do in Harrison County.

Grants like these became a possibility in Harrison County a few years ago when anonymous donors created the **Harrison County Community Foundation (HCCF)** at the Foundation for Appalachian Ohio (FAO). They wanted a local way to provide grants to advance charitable projects of benefit to Harrison County residents, as well as a

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collective resource for all those looking to make a difference in Harrison County.

Each opportunity reaches far beyond one student. Snider explained that she encouraged the students to use the books with others at home. She told students, "If you are learning to read, trade off pages with parents at home. If you are able to read it, then read it to younger brothers or sisters." With philanthropy, one gift multiplies to expand its reach.

NEW EDUCATION FUND MEANS EVERY SCHOOL DISTRICT IN GUERNSEY COUNTY HAS A PHILANTHROPIC FUND



Guernsey County is celebrating an incredible milestone. Because of anonymous donors' decision to support East Guernsey School District, all school districts in Guernsey

County now have a school district fund to support their teachers, students, and educational communities. This isn't something you see every day.

According to its founders, the **Friends of East Guernsey Education Fund** was established to create "a place for people who wanted to help out the school and support education." A school district fund like the **Friends of East Guernsey Education Fund** at FAO, a part of the Guernsey County Foundation family of funds, can build flexible resources to support teachers' creativity. Because the Fund is an endowment, the gifts will never be spent, but the interest and earnings that grow from those gifts will support the schools forever. Educators will be invited to apply for grants a few times a year to support classroom projects they may not have otherwise had the chance to share with their students.

The founders opened the Fund with FAO because of their passion for East Guernsey schools, and because they believed FAO's experience offered comprehensive support for the rural school district. The partnership with FAO will make it easy for others to make gifts and the Fund will have help promoting itself and have professional management of its assets. "There is no better way to invest in Guernsey County than to invest in our students' education," said David Caldwell, trustee of the Guernsey County Foundation.

SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT JOHNNY BARBA PLANS TO GIVE BACK

Johnny Barba knew he wanted to be a doctor when he was researching anatomy in order to avoid surgery in when he was in the seventh grade. During a basketball game he was tackled so hard that his pelvic bone cracked. Johnny wasn't interested in having two screws in his hip that would keep him out of sports for two years. So instead, he went to the library, researched physical therapy alternatives to surgery, and presented them to his doctor. He not only sped up his recovery, but he also discovered a love for medicine.

With the support of scholarship funds from the Foundation for Appalachian Ohio, Johnny will be attending Capital University in the fall to begin his premedicine studies. He is excited to begin learning the skills he needs to be able to give back to others, including those who helped him heal.

A tutor at Zane State College in Anatomy & Physiology while still a high school student, Johnny received three scholarship awards from different funds at FAO: an **AK Steel Foundation Scholastic Award for STEMM Education**, a **Lester D. and Thelma I. Ellwood Educational Scholarship**, and a **Wayne F. White and Bob Evans Scholarship**.

"I learned [about FAO's scholarship] through my counselor at school," said Johnny. "It was my favorite application to fill out. I was very honored and blessed to receive them. I plan to give all the money from the scholarships back later because they helped me get my foot in the door."

A member of the National Honor Society, Mock Trial, and the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, Johnny is looking forward to the challenges of college-level work, but he hasn't been waiting around to practice his medical skills. "Two weeks before I was born my father passed away, so I have to get an EKG to check my heart every one to two years," shared Johnny. "During my most recent



one, I started identifying the anatomy of my heart and analyzing my echocardiogram."

His doctors were impressed, but Johnny has been studying since seventh grade so it should have come as no surprise. FAO is honored to partner with its funds to help Johnny take his studies to the halls of Capital University.

In our work to grow an Appalachian Ohio abundant in opportunity, grants play a vital role in unleashing the potential of the region's organizations and communities.

Gulfport Energy to Create Lasting Opportunities



When Gulfport Energy announced the opening of an office in Belmont County this May, they also announced the opening of a fund at FAO to invest in the region. The Gulfport Energy Fund was established

to support the communities where Gulfport operates. Specifically, it will support community leaders in

International Energy Company Statoil Opens Fund for Monroe County

Monroe County now has a new source of support! Statoil, an international energy company headquartered in Norway with operations in 34 countries, has created a fund with FAO to make a positive contribution to the Monroe County community, where it operates. In celebration of extending its philanthropic focus into Appalachian Ohio, the Fund has launched its inaugural round of grant applications.

Projects should increase quality of life, create access to opportunities, and/or identify and implement a solution for a community need or issue. The inaugural grant application is now open. While funding requests of any amount may be submitted for consideration, typical grant awards will range from \$500 to \$5,000.

Application deadlines:

First Round – September 30, 2014 Second Round – December 5, 2014 Belmont, Guernsey, Harrison, and Monroe counties in creating local opportunities.

The first funding cycle for the grant awards from the Gulfport Energy Fund will focus on creating educational opportunities. This first educational funding cycle has approximately \$57,000 available for grant awards. While requests for up to \$10,000 in funding may be submitted, typical grant awards will range in size from \$500 to \$2,500.

Application deadline:

First Round – Closes September 30, 2014 Second Round – Opens January 5, 2015

Connecting Students and Their Communities With the Environment

Connecting students and communities to highlight the importance of Appalachian Ohio's natural landscape is at the center of the **AEP Access to Environmental Education Mini-Grants.** Each year,



projects provide opportunities for youth to participate in learning experiences tied to local natural resources and enable them to share lessons learned within their broader community.

Mini-grants are available to support public school and community organizations. Approximately \$23,000 in funding is available for awards ranging from \$500 to \$1,500.

Application deadline: October 7, 2014
