



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

Both Jeff and Jane have fond memories of their educations and extracurricular activities at their respective schools, and through this scholarship fund, hope to help others pursue their dreams of higher education.

If The Lester and Thelma Ellwood Scholarship, a legacy to the late Lester and Thelma Ellwood, honors the importance of education by providing encouragement and support to educational opportunities of Guernsey County high school graduates in pursuit of post-secondary education at an accredited 4-year, 2-year, or technical/trade school or university.

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2020 Appalachian Ohio scholarships

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Gulfport Energy Fund awards Over \$18,000 to HC nonprofits working in Health & Human Services, Environmental Stewardship

NELSONVILLE, OHIO Five organizations serving Harrison County will have greater support for their projects because of more than \$18,000 awarded from the Gulfport Energy Fund at the Foundation for Appalachian Ohio (FAO). The Fund's final grant round of 2019 focused on projects from nonprofit and public organizations related to health and human services as well as environmental stewardship.

The Gulfport Energy Fund at FAO was created to support nonprofits, schools, and communities through projects that increase quality of life, create access to opportunities, identify and implement a solution for a community need in the counties where Gulfport Energy operates.

A total of twelve grantees serving Belmont, Guernsey, Iefferson, Harrison, Monroe, and Noble counties received more than \$45,000 in awards through the Gulfport Energy Fund's second round of 2019. Grantees in Harrison County include:

Cambridge The **YMCA** received \$10,000 grant

Youth campaign, which Materials serves Guernsey, Harrison, and Noble counties by providing scholarships for students to participate in safe, productive activities such as soccer, basketball, and swimming. program will connect hundreds of young people opportunities to follow their passion.

The Puskarich Public Library in Harrison County received \$4,438.05 grant launch Borrow a Bike, which will help county residents embrace health and exercise by allowing library patrons to check out bikes free of charge with their library card. The grant will support the purchase of bikes, tools for repairs, staff training, and a one-year maintenance contract with a local bike shop.

Ohio Hills Health Services was awarded a \$2,064.76 grant to support a behavioral health program in Belmont, Guernsey, Harrison, Monroe, and Noble counties. The grant supports materials for play therapy, a type of therapy that allows children suffering from trauma to talk, do activities, practice new skills and solve problems as a means of responding to a wide variety of

support its Invest in mental health issues. purchased through the grant include art supplies, such as paints and clay, and interactive tools, such as puppets and dolls.

Valley The Ohio Health Center received a \$1,373.61 grant to purchase an on-site urine analysis machine for its free clinic, allowing uninsured patients in Jefferson and Harrison counties to receive a level of care to which they would not otherwise have access.

Farmers and Hunters Feeding the Hungry was awarded a \$750 grant for its "Meating the Need: Venison for the Food Challenged" program, Guernsey, serving Harrison, and Noble counties. The program encourages the harvesting of deer to control the deer population by allowing hunters to donate the deer, which are processed free of charge to provide needed protein for those without regular access to food in partnership with local food banks and pantries.

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"We are thrilled to support such a large and diverse group of grantees, all of which are doing so much within counties where Gulfport operates. organizations connect the local communities to the environmental and health needs that exist within the area," said Courtney Dickens, Gulfport's External Relations Coordinator.

Comprehensive blood screening offered



SALEM- On March 14, area residents are invited to learn more about their health by participating in a comprehensive blood screening provided by Salem Regional Medical Center (SRMC) and SRMC Primary Care – Damascus. The screening event will take place at SRMC Primary Care in Damascus, located at 28885 U.S. Route 62.

Comprehensive blood screenings can help to identify many health problems in their earliest stages, when they are most treatable, and may detect conditions such as high cholesterol, anemia, infections, diabetes and other disorders. The comprehensive screening is \$45. Optional tests available for an additional charge include a prostate specific antigen test for \$12 and HgA1c diabetes screen for \$28. A lipid panel, which measures cholesterol levels and is included in the comprehensive screening, is available as a stand-alone test for \$12. Participants should provide a self-addressed, stamped envelope at the time of the screening to receive a copy of their results.

Screenings begin at 7 a.m. An appointment is required. To schedule an appointment or for more information, call SRMC at 330-332-7685.

ODOT plans improvements on Route 164

AKRON — The Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) plans to improve state Route 164 in Beaver Township. The project proposes to replace a bridge along state Route 164 just south of West Garfield Road. Additionally, the project proposes to replace a culvert along state Route 164 between West Pine Lake Road and state Route 165. The \$1,374,984 project is scheduled to begin construction in the spring of 2021.

During project construction, a minimum of one 10-foot lane of traffic shall be maintained in each direction along state Route 164, except when necessary to close state Route 164 to traffic for a maximum of 14 consecutive calendar days to replace the two structures. The official detour route for these closures will utilize state Route 165, state Route 46 and state Route 14. These two closures shall not occur simultaneously. Construction, lane restriction, structure closure and detour information will be posted along state Route 164 and at all intersecting side streets and on the ODOT District 4 webpage,

www.transportation.ohio.gov/dist4, prior to the start of project construction. Access shall be maintained to all adjacent properties, businesses and intersecting side streets for the duration of the project.

To ensure the decision-making process is comprehensive, ODOT is seeking comments from the public about the social, environmental and economic impacts of this proposed project. Environmental impacts include those involving archeological, architectural and ecological resources, regulated materials and the general location of the project. ODOT also requests information regarding the presence of any known cultural resources in the vicinity of the project including prehistoric and historic archaeological sites, historic bridges, historic buildings, landmarks and districts. Any comments regarding the environmental impacts and/or the proposed project may be submitted by March 26, 2020.
