## MAKING A DIFFERENCE


With the support of our donors, we award grants to nonprofit and public organizations for projects and programs that benefit African Americans throughout our region, focusing on five areas essential to creating transformative and sustainable change: arts and culture, community and economic development, education, environmental stewardship, and health and human services.

# PRESERVING HISTORY AND MAKING IT ACCESSIBLE

Appalachian Ohio's pioneering history is steeped in Black American history and achievements. Resources and training are needed to preserve, share, and own those narratives.

Perry County's Rendville was one of the nation's earliest integrated communities. The Rendville Historic Preservation Society was established to preserve the village's history, heritage, and physical structures – and leave a legacy for future generations.

A 2021 AACF grant funded a Black in Appalachia project, in partnership with the Rendville Historic Preservation Society and Ohio State University's Center for Folklore Studies. The grant was used to process and digitize 1,500 items associated with Joe William's personal historical collection from the 1890s to 1950s and to train volunteers on



the digitization and cataloging process for future preservation efforts.

A 2022 ACCF grant to Black in Appalachia is supporting a photo exhibit highlighting the stories and experiences of the Black community in Gallia and Lawrence counties.

# WORKING TOGETHER TO ELIMINATE FOOD INSECURITY (CONTINUED)

For the past several years, the Alliance for Congregational Transformation in Our Neighborhoods (ACTION) has been spearheading efforts to change that, starting with pop-up markets that provide fresh food from local farmers – but only during the warmer months of the year.

In May 2022, ACTION launched its Mahoning Valley Mobile Market, a 28-foot bus equipped with freezers and refrigeration units that offer fresh and healthy food year-round. The mobile market operates at 25-30 locations a month and has served more than 5,000 local residents.

The pop-up markets and mobile market received support from many funders, including the African American Community Fund, which awarded ACTION grants in 2020 and 2021.
