These funds will be reinvested in Lawrence County for years to come.

IMPROVING QUALITY OF LIFE AND MOVING LAWRENCE COUNTY FORWARD

The Lawrence County Community Foundation is committed to helping fill the needs we see every day while building a strong foundation for the future.

With the support of our donors, we will award grants annually to nonprofit and public organizations for projects and programs benefiting the people and communities in Lawrence County. We give preference to efforts that increase quality of life, create access to opportunities, or implement a solution to a local need, focusing on five areas essential to creating transformative and sustainable change: arts and culture, community and economic development, education, environmental stewardship, and health and human services.

In partnership with FAO's *I'm a Child of Appalachia®* Fund, last fall LCCF awarded its first grants, totaling \$10,000, to the following local organizations:

RLB Ministries

Last year, RLB Ministries' Backpack Buddies program served 150 families through its emergency food pantry and 615 children through its back-to-school clothing giveaway; provided 350 children winter coats and weekly backpacks of food to nourish them over weekends; and gave 400 families holiday meal boxes. An LCCF grant will help fill those needs in 17 Lawrence County schools.





Ironton in Bloom

Public and private partnerships have resulted in many revitalization efforts in downtown Ironton in recent years. A grant from LCCF will help fund a new one – construction of a mini-park near the Ohio River Bridge, which will enhance the main entrance to the Ironton Historic Downtown District, preserve history, and educate visitors about some of the city's history.

IMPROVING QUALITY OF LIFE AND MOVING LAWRENCE COUNTY FORWARD (CONTINUED)

Macedonia Missionary Baptist Church

Macedonia Missionary Baptist Church is Ohio's first Black church and the only surviving antebellum Black church in the state. An LCCF grant is providing the last of the funding needed to complete the church's historic structure report, which will include an assessment of its current condition and recommendations for renovation plans, paving the way for the future of this county treasure.

New Hope United Methodist Church

For the past 15 years, New Hope United Methodist Church has been providing Lawrence County youth backpacks and supplies to ensure that they start the school year with the resources needed to learn and thrive in the classroom. A grant from LCCF will allow the back-to-school giveaway to expand and serve more children in three of the county's school districts.

Third and Center

Since 2020, Third and Center has collaborated with local artists, other community groups, and the city of Ironton on a Riverfront Beautification project that has resulted in the revival of three murals and the installation of four more. With support from an LCCF grant, the project will be expanded to include an interactive arts experience, detailing the murals' history and significance and encouraging users to explore Ironton and Lawrence County.
